### 2008 Election Results

In October all Diablo members were sent a ballot listing seven candidates for the five open positions on the 2009 Board of Directors. The five candidates receiving the most votes will serve a two year term beginning January 1st. There was also a ballot question to accept or reject a set of five amendments to the region bylaws.

I'd like to thank all the candidates for stepping forward and offering to serve on the Board. This is the ultimate commitment of time and energy to make Diablo a better region for all our members, and you deserve to be recognized for it.

I also want to thank our fellow members for taking the time to vote—this is your region, and it's important that your voice be heard when it comes to the region leadership.

On Saturday, November 1st the ballots were counted. One hundred and forty-four members cast their votes, representing over 14% of the total Diablo membership. The results were officially submitted to the Board of Directors at their monthly meeting on November 11th.

### **Board of Directors**

The total votes for each candidate for the Board were as follows:

In the event of a tie, ballots received after the October 25th deadline were opened and counted in order to break the tie. This resulted in two additional votes for Kay Maloy, electing her to the fifth open position.

In addition to the published candidates there were three write-in votes: John Clever, John Place, and Steve Jones. Each of these write-ins received a single vote.

Therefore, the new members of the Diablo Board of Directors for 2009 are: Linda Boyd, Francisco Cabrita, Jim Edmunds, Phil Eskildsen, and Kay Maloy.

Members of the Board whose terms run through December 31st, 2009 are: Warren Gardner, Steve Jones, Jerry Torres, and Ken Wu (appointed to the position left vacant by Ron Leppke's passing). These seats on the Board will be up for election in October, 2009.

### **Amending the Bylaws**

Diablo members were asked to vote on a package of five changes to the region's bylaws, which had last been officially changed in 1997. The bylaws require that votes to change our bylaws be conducted in conjunction with the annual Board of Directors election in October unless an emergency change is needed.

The results were 132 votes in favor of the changes, and 2 votes against. Since this is more than the two-thirds necessary under the bylaws, the motion carries and the bylaws are amended. The bylaws will be edited accordingly and posted, and an announcement will be made when they are available for download. In the meantime, the following documents are still available:

You receive Diablo's notices and mailings because PCA National knows your email address, mailing address, and other details. It's vital that these records be kept up to date so that we can keep you informed about our activities, and so that your copy of Panorama can be delivered. But did you know that you can update this information yourself? Here's how:

### Step 1.

Go to PCA National's web site at <a href="http://www.pca.org">http://www.pca.org</a> and scroll to the bottom of the screen.

You will see a login box like the one pictured below.



### Note:

PCA National automatically creates an account for every PCA member. If you've never used your account before, click on the "Read this!" link for instructions on how to access your account.

### Step 2.

Log in; the homepage will display again, but with a few differences. The information you need to review is located in the blue box in the upper right corner as shown in the example below.

### Step 3.

Verify your information is correct and current. To update or change any of the items, click on the item to be changed. An editing screen will display, as shown on the next page. Update the information, click the "Submit" button and the changes will be submitted directly to PCA National.

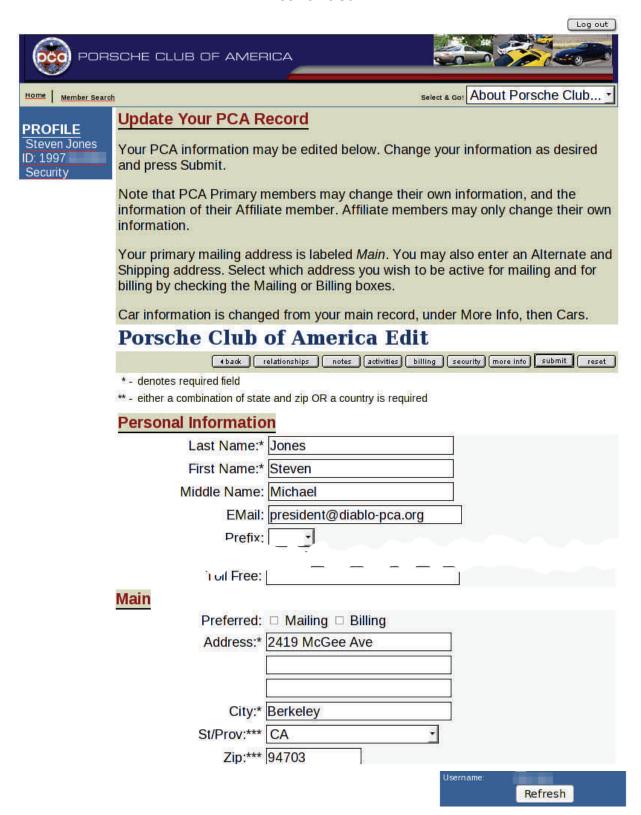
Your information is now updated and current.

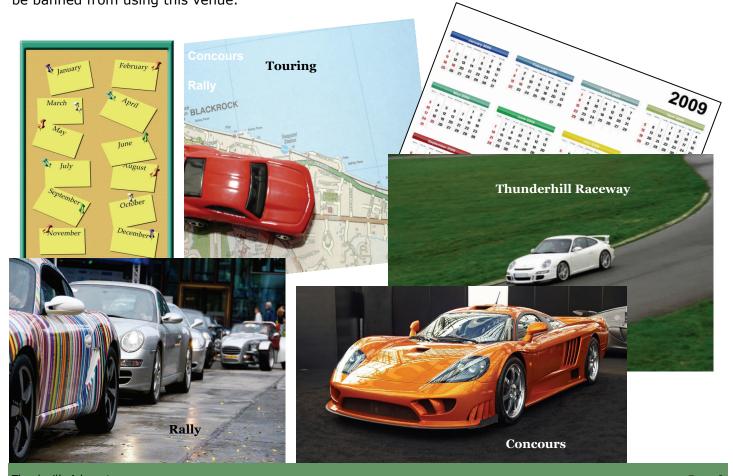
The venue is the clubhouse located by the pool. Do not look for a house numbered 1999 Nero Court --go to the end of the court, and proceed to the clubhouse by the pool area!

From I-680 take the Treat Boulevard exit and head East. Take a right on Bancroft Road. Make a right at the traffic light for La Corso Circle, followed by a right onto La Corso Drive. Take a left on Cabot Drive.

You can park on Cabot Drive near Cesar Court and walk up Cesar to the club house, or take a right onto Via Appia and park on Via Appia close to Nero Court, then walk up Nero to the club house.

### Guidelines

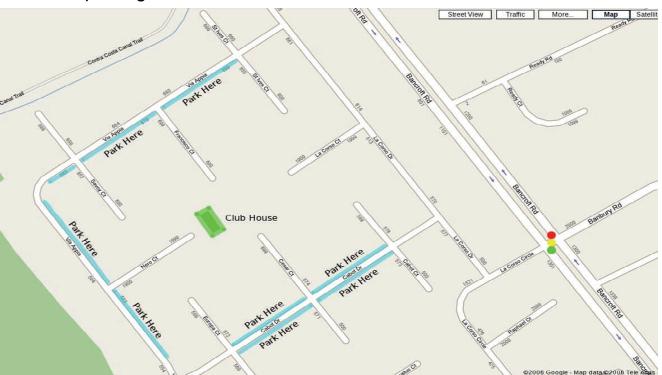
NOTE: Street parking is \*only\* allowed on Cabot Drive and Via Appia! Do not block driveways, and do not park on any street name ending in Court - they are too narrow, you will be towed, and the club will be banned from using this venue.

### Porsche Secures LMP2 and GT2 Manufacturers Titles with Key Performances by Penske Racing, Flying Lizard Motorsports at Laguna Seca Finale

ATLANTA - October 18 - Porsche entered today's Monterey Sports Car Challenge, the final round of the 2008 American Le Mans Series, with the LMP2 prototype drivers championship and the GT2 production-based drivers championship already clinched, but the manufacturers titles in both classes were still up for grabs.

But, when the checked flag fell on the four-hour sports car classic early Saturday evening, a Porsche race team in each class scored a third point finish - good enough for the marquee to win both manufacturers championships.

In a race which featured 13 yellow flags and a racing surface which lost its grip due to excessive gravel on the track from the many racing incidents, the 2007 and 2008 LMP2 drivers champions, Romain Dumas (France) and Timo Bernhard (Germany), overcame an offtrack incident of their own to guide their Penske Porsche RS Spyder to a third-place finish—just high enough to edge Acura by a single point in the final standings. Porsche ended up with 214 points, and Acura, with its one-two finish at Laguna, finished second with 213. Penske Racing had previously clinched their third straight LMP2 team title.

In the production-based GT2 class, Porsche had a more comfortable lead of 15 points going into the last event, but a strong contingent of Ferraris threatened to overcome those points with a sweep of the top position in the four-hour finale. But the Flying Lizard Motorsports Porsche 911 GT3 RSR of Patrick Pilet (France)/Johannes van Overbeek (USA) finished fourth in class to seal the manufacturers championship, 220 - 215. Originally, Dirk Werner (Germany)/Bryce Miller (USA) in the Farnbacher Loles Racing Porsche 911 GT3 RSR had finished third, but the car was excluded at post-race tech for a ride height violation due to a broken right front spring.

Previously, Joerg Bergmeister and Wolf Henzler (both Germany) had clinched the drivers championship in their Flying Lizard Porsche, and Flying Lizard Motorsports had sealed the team title - their first.

Hartmut Kristen, head of Porsche Motorsport, couldn't have planned the season any better for this final result.

"To win all six championships - team, driver, and manufacturers titles in both LMP2 and GT2 - is so much satisfying than any individual race that we could win. This team effort included all our teams, their drivers and crews, our engineers - both at the track and in Germany - and all the Porsche AG, Porsche Motorsport, and Porsche Cars North America employees that helped make this happen. A special thanks must go to Penske Racing and Flying Lizard Motorsports, the teams that produced the drivers championships and contributed heavily to the manufacturers titles," said Kristen.

Paul Ritchie, president of Porsche Motorsport North America, was particularly gratified with the success of the 2008 Porsche 911 GT3 RSR after the 2007, when Ferrari got the best of Porsche for the championship.

"Over the winter, the engineers at Weissach, led by Roland Kussmaul, completely revamped the race car, including a new aerodynamic package and a four-liter engine, and provided us with a great package - and our teams did the rest. A special thanks must go to my staff at Porsche Motorsports North America, who provided critical parts and service support to keep everyone on the track," said Ritchie, whose organization is based in Santa Ana, Calif.

Other LMP2 Porsche finishers included Helio Castroneves/Ryan Briscoe in the Penske Porsche RS Spyder (fourth); Guy Smith/Chris Dyson in the Dyson Racing Porsche RS Spyder (fifth); and Marino Franchitti/Butch Leitzinger in the other Dyson Racing Porsche RS Spyder.

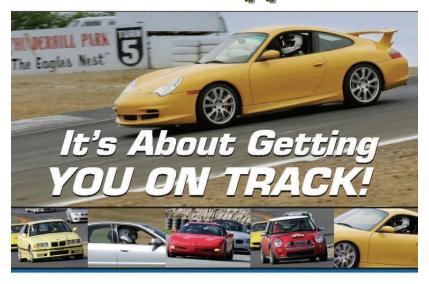
Other GT2 Porsche finishers the Darren Law/Seth Neiman Flying Lizard Porsche (fifth); the Joerg Bergmeister/Wolf Henzler Flying Lizard Porsche (ninth after an early-race accident resulting in a long pit stop for suspension replacement). The Francesco Pastorelli/Nicky Pastorelli/Mark Basseng VICI Racing Porsche did not finish due to an early-race accident.

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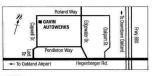

### The Correct Driving Position

Have you ever been cruising down the highway and happened to notice the driving position of certain people in the car next to you? A few people drive with their seat set all the way back. Their arms are fully stretched out, having no bend at all in their elbows. Then some people are so close to the steering wheel that you could not slip a CD between the steering wheel and their chest. Well obviously, both of these positions are incorrect for a number of reasons. The first and foremost is safety. In both of these positions the driver does not have the leverage or the movement required in their arms to make emergency driving corrections. For a professional race car driver or people lucky enough to have their own dedicated race car, their seat and steering wheel is set to a specified position that never changes. They do this so that every time they get into their cars, the position is optimized to help them best perform their job. Go fast! They can't do that without the correct seating set-up.

So is there actually an ideal position for all drivers? Well, there is something very close to a perfect position that allows for comfort (which leads to less fatigue), leverage, bracing and good control of the vehicle in all types of driving conditions. It was not until I attended my first

driving school that I actually learned about the correct seating position. If you attend a Professional Sports Car Race, you will see almost every driver using this same set-up.

Let's look at how to adjust the seat and steering wheel to provide you with the proper set-up for both street and track driving conditions. We will start with the seating position since that is our first contact with the car and every other adjustment is predicated on the correct seat set-up. Adjust the seat to the lowest position that still allows you a good view of the road ahead. This not only helps to lower the car's center of gravity for better cornering and performance, but it also places the driver's body closer to the vehicle's yaw, pitch and roll axis. This

gives the driver a better feel for what the car is doing during any changes in speed or direction. Your derrière should be tucked firmly into the seat back, so that you can get feedback from the chassis, through the seat, up your spine and finally reaching the brain (where you can determine what the car is doing). You will get a better feel as to what the rear end of the car is doing if your body is firmly anchored to the seat. Position the seat forward enough so your knee still has some **bend** in it with the clutch pedal being **fully** depressed. You do not want to be able to fully extend your leg or have to stretch while depressing the clutch. That will not provide you with adequate leverage while engaging the clutch or brake pedals. Also, you do not want the steering column interfering with the movement of your legs while you are operating the brake or clutch. Your right foot should be comfortably placed to allow you to pivot the foot from the

accelerator to the brake pedal without lifting the heel off the floor. The left foot, when not operating the clutch, should be resting on the "dead pedal" (that's what it is there for). This will provide you some additional bracing while cornering or during an emergency maneuver.

Now that we have your feet and legs positioned correctly, let's take a look at the arm position. The correct distance from the steering wheel is easily adjusted with some simple techniques. The proper distance can be achieved with your shoulders resting on the very top of the steering wheel. The wrists should be able to break so that your hands are able to droop over the far side of the wheel. If your wrists do not break at the top of the wheel, then you will need to adjust the seat (or adjust the angle of the seat-back) forward or backward to achieve this position. If your steering wheel has adjustability for reach (in and out) and height (up and down), this will give you some additional help in fine tuning your optimal position. You will probably notice that the angle of your seat-back (when adjusted correctly) will be more upright than you are accustomed to. Being too close or too far away from the wheel will inhibit your ability to maneuver in tight corners; i.e., driving on mountain roads, swerving to avoid an animal that might run into the street or driving on a race track. An improper position may even require you to move your hands on the steering wheel while cornering, which is not only a terrible technique but can also be dangerous.

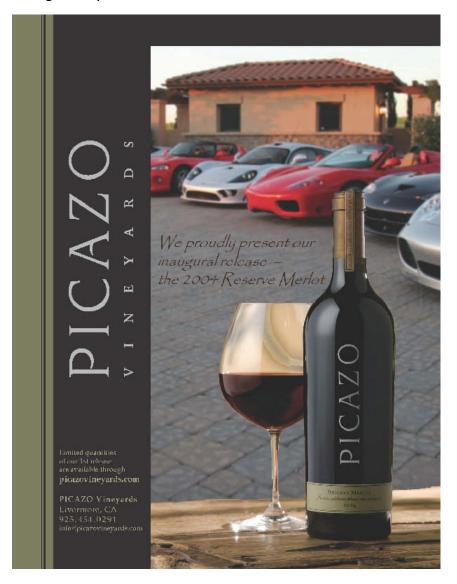

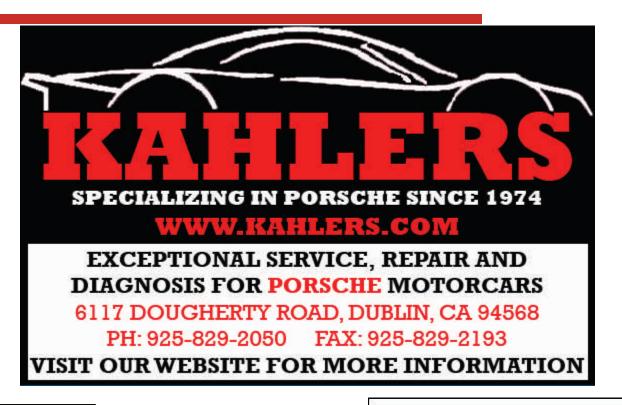
Your hand position on the steering wheel should be in the 9 and 3 o'clock positions with the thumbs in contact with the 9 and 3 o'clock spokes of the wheel. This will give you more direct feedback from the front suspension in case of over or under-steering conditions. Your right hand will also be in a better position for reaching the gear shift lever and allows for a more natural movement when grabbing for that next gear. Locating your hands this way allows for more steering input in tight corners, without your forearms crossing over each other. If you have front air bags, it is slightly safer in helping to prevent wrist or hand damage in case of an air bag deployment as well. Lastly, your elbows should be allowed to rest comfortably by your side.

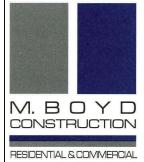
Now for a final check of your position. After you believe you have everything set correctly, see if you have between 90 and 130 degrees of bend in the elbows, with your hands in the 9 and 3 o'clock position. Then make sure all of the dials and dash lights on the instrument panel are clearly visible without the steering wheel impeding your view. All three mirrors should be set to provide you with adequate visibility in all directions. With these final checks completed, you have successfully achieved your correct position. If you are like most people, you will find that your original position was a little too far away from the pedals and the steering wheel. You were holding the wheel in the 10 and 2 positions and the seat-back was reclined too much. This new position will probably feel uncomfortable and strange to you at first. With a little practice and care in your seating set-up (whether you are driving your Porsche or another car), you can

develop a better driving position that leads not only to better car control, but also makes for safer driving as well. This will provide you with a quick set-up routine. You can carry this from one car to another and it only takes a minute to correctly set your position once you know what you are doing.

After reading this article, my wife Robin, actually tried this new seating position. As predicted, she complained that she was too close to the wheel and felt very uncomfortable while driving. But with just a few weeks of practice, she has become accustomed to her new set-up. Now she thinks I am the most wunderbar husband for teaching her something new and useful (like I've never done that before), yada, yada, yada. If **she** was able to change and improve her driving habits after some 35 years behind the wheel, then anyone can (a mandated age disclaimer; FYI my wife politely told me to mention that she started driving when she was 2 years old)—yea right. Next to buckling your seat belt, this is probably the most important thing you can do to help ensure your driving safety.







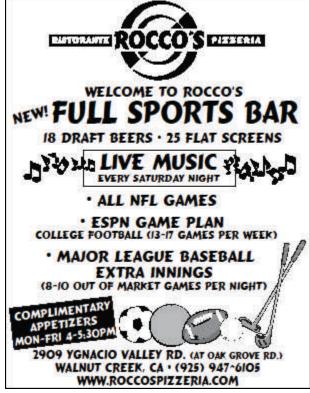
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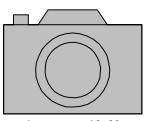

From SFO (Airport) take US-101 north to San Francisco. Take Bay Bridge (I-80) east to I-580, then connect to Hwy. 24 heading east toward Walnut Creek. At the Walnut Creek interchange, take I-680 south to Crow Canyon Road exit. Go east (left) on Crow Canyon Road 4.2 miles. Turn right on Camino Tassajara. The first left (at the Century Blackhawk Plaza Theater) is the entrance to Blackhawk Plaza. The second right takes you into the closest parking area. The Museum is on the hill behind the Anthropologie Building.

### From Oakland Airport

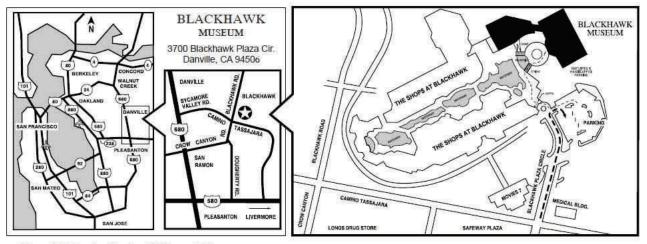
Take I-880 south toward San Jose. Just past San Leandro, at Hayward, take Hwy. 238 to connect to I-580 east. Take I-680 north (toward Walnut Creek) at the Dublin / Pleasanton interchange to Crow Canyon Road exit. Go east (right) on Crow Canyon Road 4.2 miles. Turn right on Camino Tassajara. The first left (at the Century Blackhawk Plaza Theater) is the entrance to Blackhawk Plaza. The second right takes you into the closest parking area. The Museum is on the hill behind the Anthropologie Building.

### From San Jose

Take I-680 north to Crow Canyon Road exit. Go east (right) on Crow Canyon Road 4.2 miles. Turn right on Camino Tassajara. The first left (at the Century Blackhawk Plaza Theater) is the entrance to Blackhawk Plaza. The second right takes you into the closest parking area. The Museum is on the hill behind the Anthropologie Building.

### From Central Valley

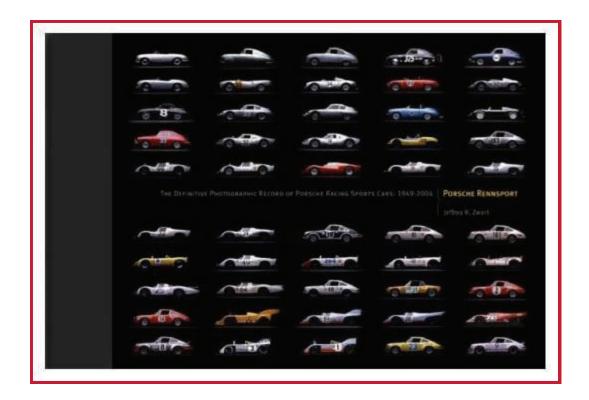
