

Our Porsche Factory Tour

We had been planning on a Stuttgart factory tour and trying to work it into our schedule for over 5 years. Last April, we had the privilege of taking one of our sons and his fiancé with us. Why? Well that's a story for another time.

It turns out you don't just walk in to the Stuttgart Museum (across the street from the factory) and say "I want a factory tour today." It took many months of e-mails and finally a phone call to secure the date we wanted. (My thanks to Gunter at Fremont Porsche for really making it happen). We received a very detailed e-mail from the factory describing exactly what we needed to do for the tour.

The English speaking tours are only once a day at 10:00AM. At precisely 10:00AM, they call out the names of those on the list and check you off. There were only 10 of us in our tour. We had a guide and a "minder" who followed at the back of the group and didn't talk much. The first surprise was "please put all cameras and cell phones in the basket. We will return them to you at the end of the tour." So much for the photo ops.

Although some of the buildings are historic, all the working contents are totally state of the art automobile factory production. There are many specialized conveyors and transport systems, lots of robots doing the boring and very precise operations that robots are so good at. The whole factory is "just in time" delivery of all parts to the proper station. All models (except the Cayenne and Panamera) go down the same Stuttgart assembly line. You see a Boxster followed by a Carrera S, followed by a Turbo, etc. all on the same constantly moving conveyer. You've probably seen the lists of numerous options available for Porsches these days. Keeping track of what part goes on what car is handled by computers and systems we did not see. All cars on the line are custom ordered and pre-sold either to individuals or dealers.

The tour was about two hours long and took us through all the major

assembly steps (except painting). You are really up close to most operations, to the point of having to watch out for the moving robot trains carrying parts all over the factory. Some of the highlights were:

- The robot applying the mastic to the windshield and then precisely placing it in the exact spot needed. Yes, lasers are used to measure the location of the car.
 - Robots welding car body parts together. I've seen it on TV, but in person.....
- Wheels and tires are mounted and balanced on the assembly line at the station where they go on the car! The tires and wheels arrive via separate elevators. The automated equipment that mounts and balances the tires is unique, impressive, and very fast.
- The CAD operated water jet that cuts the leather pieces for the interior does a set of whole cowhides at once. Workers then separate and stack the pieces for sewing and interior panel use. The leftover scraps, we were allowed to touch, as they are sold to others for non-automotive uses. They are nearly dry right out of the machine. Come to think of it, that was the ONLY thing we were allowed to touch on the whole tour.
- There is beer in the vending machines for the workers.

They are very careful during assembly to get things right the first time. We were told that if they can fix a problem on the assembly line, it costs less than \$100. If they have to fix it after the car is completed, it can be a thousand dollars or more. And, of course, if it is discovered outside of the factory, it can cost many thousands to fix.

Our guide was an intern studying hybrid propulsion system engineering. He said he would love to get a full time job with Porsche when he graduates.





Fall track activities – the countdown begins.

August already? Less than 10 weeks until our next DE event – an evening presentation and track introduction (DE101) before our autumn track event at Thunderhill on 10/29, only 12 weeks away (look out for final details coming soon)!

We have opened Thunderhill and Laguna Seca (11/19) track events for sign-ups at motorsportreg.com. Both events are limited to 60 cars to ensure loads of track space and time.

It pays to start thinking about your car in plenty of time...to monitor its needs in advance. Tires, brake pads and other parts sacrifice themselves for our fun, but wear out over time. They can be expensive and inconvenient if you have to change them at the last minute. Tires are easily visible so most people know when they are getting low, but brake pads and rotors take a bit more inspection.

In March, several people found that theirs were low only a couple of weeks before the event and had to rush to get the work done at the last minute. If your brakes or tires need changing, it's best to have several hundred miles on new parts to break them in before you go to the track. If anything needs doing, finding out early will give you time to shop around and plan.

Don't forget to book your hotel if required for the night before or after. At hotels close to many tracks, there are discounts if you mention you are attending a local track event.

If you don't want to drive the track but are interested in seeing how it all works, just come out and lend a hand. There's a lot to do and we will gladly introduce you around to the members taking part. You can take a turn manning the grid, attend the driver's meeting and join in the parade laps – which are slow speed and don't require helmets, but are a useful orientation to feel what it's like out on track.

Our planned Car Control Clinic/Performance Driving Event is an opportunity for all ages and driving experience, including driving-age

kids. We have a clear plan on what to do, how to do it and we know there is interest out there...we are now finalizing the where and the when

A small team has put time and energy into planning a day of driving fun, with the opportunity to learn lots about handing your car when things don't go right, under heavy braking or hard cornering, similar to the things you may need to do to take evasive action on the road, or simply get things wrong...

But, we need help to make it happen. You don't need to be a driving expert – just happy to help set up and organize on the day (as well as drive and have fun, of course). Epicurean Napa Valley Play Day Tour By Marc Giammona

A perfect Northern California July morning greeted the participants of the Epicurean Napa Valley Play day tour. Over 20 cars and 35+ enthusiastic members assembled at the Buttercup Grill & Bar for a little conversation and fuel before heading out to the scenic Napa Valley. Our tour hostess, Lillie, led the driver's meeting, and went over the usual disclaimers and handed out the route instructions. The weather was fine for top down motoring for those so inclined and we were soon on our way heading north on 680 to Vacaville where the more scenic roads of the Pope Valley and Howell Mountain reside.



After a short pit stop for fuel, munchies and "health break", the group made their way through North Vacaville and the confines of the urban environment to the switchbacks and diminishing radius turns of the Pope Valley. The tour roads wind through the scenic hillside of Howell Mountain and are a Porsche driver's delight. We took 128 to the Monticello Hydroelectric facility at Lake Berryessa where we stopped ever so briefly for our first photo opportunity. From the dam site we continued on around Lake Berryessa and transitioned on to Pope Valley Road. The roads in this area were filled with complex turns, short straight-aways and towering Redwoods. It is an excursion like this that reminds me how lucky we are to live in an area with views that are as breathtaking as the roads. All too quickly we were at the crest of the mountain and looking down on the beautiful Napa Valley and heading for Oakville and our first stop at Silver Oak Cellars. We were blessed with very few bikes to contend with and arrived intact as a group at Silver Oak.

The tour group congregated at the roundabout for our second photo op of the day anchored by Silver Oak's iconic water tower in the background. The staff from Silver Oak Cellars took the group on a private tour where we learned about the history of Silver Oak Cellars and how the fire in 2006 lead to a new beginning for the winery. The tour was followed by a private tasting and the opportunity to mingle


in front of the tasting bar: a perfect opportunity for introductions, a little car talk and the ability to purchase some of your favorite libations to fill the trunk of your Porsche.



Tri-Valley Saturday Breakfast


